Shelby Natasha (she/they) is a songwriter and music producer in Seattle, Washington. Heavily influenced by her upbringing living between China and the Pacific Northwest, her music is a blend of alt-rnb and Chinese folk music. Her ghost-like vocals are performed alongside the traditional Chinese instrument, Guzheng, layered on top lofi beats.

Olivia Cesarano (she/her) is a 20 year old professional dance artist based out of Seattle. She began her training at two years old at Tempe Dance Academy in Arizona and was a competitive dancer throughout her childhood. Olivia attended the University of Arizona for two years before joining a pre-professional training program in Vancouver, BC through Lamon Dance. She worked in 2024 alongside Dance Novella as an emerging artist. Olivia has worked with artists from around the world and from major companies including NDT, Batsheva, Kidd Pivot, Gothenburg Ballet, Ballet BC, and many others. Olivia is currently looking to choreograph and share her work to the world. She has big ambitions and plans for the future and has been dreaming of becoming the dancer she's always wanted to be.

Andreya Pro (they/she) is a queer, disabled, & Latine multidisciplinary artist in the PNW. Holding their BFA in theatre performance, they've worked professionally as an actor, singer, designer, and writer throughout Seattle & the South Sound. Andreya is passionate about equitable, accessible, and intentional art. She believes in centering intersectional stories, supporting diverse voices and in making the strange familiar and the familiar strange.

Ieva Bračiulytė (she/her) is a Seattle-based movement artist. Since graduating in 2021 from the University of Washington with a B.A. in Dance, Ieva has danced with PRICEarts, where she first met Eva, and more recently ZCO, a Seattle heels performance company. She has had the pleasure of working with and performing in pieces by Dani Tirrell, Majinn O'Neal, Rachael Lincoln, Noel Price, Natalya Z, zoe|juniper, and Yin Yue. Ieva recently performed a duet with Lisa Kwak at CO– 6 and is now looking forward to continuing to make collaborative multimedia artwork with her peers.

Eva Crystal (she/her) has enjoyed a diverse career in dance and teaching across the West Coast, from California to Washington. She graduated Magna Cum Laude from Loyola Marymount University, earning a B.A. in Dance. In collaboration with Halie Donabedian. Eva has co-created duets that have been showcased at the MixMatch Dance Festival and ACDA Baja in Los Angeles. She was also featured as a guest artist during a residency at University of North Carolina Greensboro. In 2019, Eva relocated to Seattle, where she was a company member with PRICEarts for many seasons as well as a freelance artist. She has participated in the Wielding Forms Festival (in works by SLOWBURN Dance, and Psychopomp Dance Theatre) by Coriolis Dance, Boost Dance Festival, and as a guest artist with the University of Washington's Chamber Dance Company. Currently, Eva is dividing her time between Oregon and Washington during her inaugural season with the Shaun Keylock Company, where she has appeared in repertory by Portland icon Gregg Bielemeier, Dance Theatre of Harlem's Derek Brockington, and most recently was featured with the company in the Portland Jazz Festival collaborating with the musicians of Methods Body.

Alisa Popova (she/they) is an improviser, dancer, performance artist, healer, seeker. Magic and profound awe can be found in the unexpected, the mysterious, and the uncertain, and in order to access this magic, control must be relinquished. Alisa sees performance and improvisation (together or separately) as an opportunity for transformation, both for performer and viewer. Alisa has been pulled to express through performance and improvised dance since she was quite young. Her work has been presented by Velocity Dance Center, Malden Works, Sheri Brown, and others, as well as self-produced. As an artist, Samantha is interested in collaboration across artistic forms as a channel for immersive experiences.

Catriona Urquhart (she/her) is originally from Denver, CO. She moved to Seattle to pursue a BFA in Dance from Cornish College of the Arts, which she completed in 2020. As a freelance stage manager and lighting designer, she worked on Dayna Hansen's Re/33: The Uninvited (2018) and multiple installments of 12 Minutes Max at Base (2017-2023). Her film Shaker Pond at Midnight appeared in the Northwest Film Forum's Local Sightings 2019 Film Festival. She produced and choreographed her own show, Vivid Little Burst in early 2020.
